
Purpose of the tour: To understand the present and past condition of the project Polavaram.

History and other information:

The Polavaram Project, located on the Godavari River in Andhra Pradesh, is a multi-purpose irrigation project granted National status by the Indian Government. Its reservoir extends up to 150 km back from the dam on the Main River and approximately 115 km on the Sabari River side, affecting parts of Chhattisgarh and Odisha. The project boosts tourism in the Godavari Districts, covering attractions like the Papikonda National Park. Additionally, the Polavaram hydroelectric project and National Waterway 4 are under construction nearby. The project is situated 40 km upstream of the Sir Arthur Cotton Barrage in Rajamahendravaram City and 25 km from Rajahmundry Airport.

The Polavaram Project has a history dating back several decades. The idea for the project was conceived as early as the 1940s, with proposals for harnessing the waters of the Godavari River to address the irrigation needs of the region, particularly in the drought-prone areas of Andhra Pradesh. In 1941, Sir Arthur Cotton, a British engineer renowned for his contributions to water resource management in India, proposed the construction of a dam across the Godavari River near Polavaram. However, it wasn't until much later that serious efforts were made to initiate the project.




In 1978, the Government of Andhra Pradesh commissioned the detailed project report for the Polavaram Project. Subsequently, in 1980, the Central Water Commission granted technical clearance for the project. Over the years, the project faced various challenges, including funding issues, environmental concerns, and disputes over water sharing with neighboring states. Despite these challenges, the project continued to progress, with various governments at the state and central levels showing commitment to its completion. In 2005, the Government of India declared the Polavaram Project a national project, signifying its importance for national development and committing to providing financial assistance for its completion.

The department of History conducted a tour to Polavaram Project on 13-12-2018. The



Government of Andhra Pradesh arranged traveling and other facilities to all the enthusiastic travelers of the state so that people will get aware of the history, present situation and future of the dream project and get inspired by the efforts of the society to make it better.





### Brief Report :

On December 21, 2019, the Department of History organized a field visit for third-year Bachelor of Arts (BA) students to the Rajapangidigudem Zamindari fort, located in Rajapangidigudem village, Dwaraka Tirumala Mandal, West Godavari District. The zamindari system, which emerged during British colonial rule, was initially established by the East India Company in 1793. This system involved the granting of land revenue rights to



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local landlords or zamindars in exchange for tax collection duties. Among the notable zamindars associated with the Rajapangidigudem Zamindari were Sri Raja Bommadevara Venkata Narasimha Naidu and Shri Raja Bommadevara Naganna Naidu Bahadur. These zamindars played significant roles in the socio-economic and political landscape of the region during their tenure.

### Brief Report :






